## LOCAL GREEN SPACES

Goose Field – Burrough on the Hill										
<b>BG1.1</b>	2	4	4	4	3	2	1	3	2	<b>25</b>
Small green field off Main Street. Rough grassland and field trees. Used for grazing domesticated geese. Special to residents and visitors for its contribution to village rural character, provides for safe and close observation of farm animals. Within setting of Grade II* church and part of the late medieval settlement pattern as shown on the 1607 Brasenose map, when likely part of a croft.										

Chestnut Triangle - Burrough on the Hill

Public space within the settlement; a rare example of a bounded and grassed triangular 'way-marker' with central tree, at junction of rural roads. With educational value – once a common rural feature, now only two survive in the Parish. Contributes historic character to the village and adjacent built heritage.										

Kings Lane Paddock – Burrough on the Hill

Bounded, grassed paddock with remains of traditional orchard, earthworks of past boundary division, within setting of two Grade II dwellings. Recognizable land parcel depicted in 1607 Brasenose map and part of the early settlement pattern. Contributes to unique landscape setting of village, with valued views to and from Burrough Hill ramparts.										

Gilson Green – Burrough on the Hill

Public green space near village entrance, cottage row and public house, grassed and attractively planted through community efforts with further potential for this use. Once part of grounds of demolished C16 manor (MLE4062 and 4063) as shown on 1607 Brasenose College map.

Chrystine Pettifer Memorial Garden - Burrough on the Hill

Somerby Village Green - Somerby

Attractive public green space on the High St, the site of the Millennium Marker and used for social and recreational purposes, such as Parade's End, Arnhem Day commemoration. Located at the historic site of Somerby Hall (demolished), with tree plantings and benches and in the setting of Grade II Somerby House and Grade I church.										

Horse Pond - Somerby

A public green space off the High St., special to the community as a small nature reserve and social space used for recreation and family activities. The pond, once part of the grounds of Somerby Hall is shown on the 1885 OS map of village. It is now planted and maintained by community volunteers. Lawned, planted with water irises and wildflowers; attractive to wildlife such as ducks, moor hens, newts and others.										

High Street Green - Somerby

Adjacent to Somerby School, currently used for student recreation and school events, lawned and with tree plantings. Fern, Middle and End Cottages Gardens - Somerby
